

- 1. New legislation
- 2. Pricing review
- 3. Government Holdings review



Exposure draft of the Radiocommunications Bill 2017

Objects of the Bill

- To promote the long-term public interest derived from the use of the spectrum by providing for the management of the spectrum in a manner that:
 - Facilitates the efficient planning, allocation and use of the spectrum
 - Facilitates the use of the spectrum for defence, public and community purposes
 - Supports the communications policy objectives of the Commonwealth Government
- To establish an efficient system for the regulation of equipment.

Repositioning roles

The Minister's role

Provide strategic priorities to guide the ACMA in the delivery of its spectrum management regulatory functions.

- Ministerial policy statements
- General ministerial direction power

The ACMA's role

To develop and implement spectrum management policy and day to day administration of spectrum (consistent with government policy).

• Annual work program

Ministerial policy statements

What is a Ministerial Policy Statement?	 A Ministerial policy statement is a notifiable instrument released as needed that may: provide specific or general policy guidance set out Government expectations and strategic priorities be long or short term in duration be updated or withdrawn as needed.
ACMA response	 The ACMA will: have regard to any relevant Ministerial policy statement report on how regard has been given to the statements
Suggested topics or issues to be covered at commencement	 May include guidance on the following issues: establishing the single licensing framework licence renewal protection of the RQZ and SKA the content of the ACMA's annual work plan broadcasting arrangements.




Australian Radiofrequency Spectrum Plan 2017



Delegation and management rights



Examples

May be delegated

- Issue licences; making a licence issue scheme
- Variation
- Renewal
- Suspension/cancellation in certain circumstances
- Maintain the register
- Make spectrum authorisations
- Assist in resolution of interference complaints


ACMA and Minister

(not delegated)

- Determine application or scope of the Act
- Make interference management guidelines
- Enforcement powers
- Emergency orders
- Ministerial directions and decision
- Ministerial policy statements
- Make register rules, certification rules, accreditation rules

Transitional arrangements Consultation Paper

Principles for transitional arrangements

The access and obligations of existing licence holders will not be diminished during the transition from the existing framework to the new.

Transitional arrangements will:


- be as simple as possible
- be transparent and predictable
- be implemented with minimal disruption to user business activities
- make clear licensees rights and obligations during the transition period
- provide licensees with adequate consultation and/or notice in advance of transition of the licensing framework for them.

Design of new licences – one scenario

New Act commences 12-14 months after assent	Consultation and progressive implementation of single licensing system as designed by ACMA	
 Some aspects may commence: Some class licence to Spectrum Authorisations Compliance and Enforcement provisions (including penalties) Inspector appointments Accredited persons arrangements Register Rules Exemption determinations Protected symbols determinations Space objects determinations 	New categories of licences available following design of each category by ACMA in consultation with stakeholders




